President's Message

8 Ways to Spread the Word about the DBC

This past year+ has found many of us close to home, exploring our more immediate surroundings. People have spent more time in local parks and looking out their backyard windows, noticing the bird world and its goings-on at possibly record levels! DBC membership has grown by leaps and bounds.

Our communications and outreach teams have done a fabulous job employing our new website, social media, Zoom, and the *Drummings* to share activities and our love of birds with members and the wider public. Whether it's these diligent efforts, buzz from members, or articles appearing in the *Daily Herald*, the word is out about birding and about the DuPage Birding Club.

Potential member or not, it's great to let people know a club like ours is out there and is eager to share its love of birds and the natural world with anyone interested. Here are a few ways to spread the word.

- 1. Tag your bird- and club-related posts and pictures with #dupagebirdingclub on Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, and other social media. By the way, we're always looking for photos of club members and birds for the website, so email dupagebirdingclub@gmail.com if you have field trip or event images you'd like to share.
- 2. Volunteer to help Donna Kubik and the Outreach/Youth Education team. Not only have they created a splendid bunch of website resources <u>for educators</u> and <u>beginning birders</u>, club members are also sharing their love of birds with community groups via Zoom and in person. Email <u>dkubik@dupagebirding.org</u> to learn more.
- 3. This will become easier once we start meeting in person again, but the club has printed brochures and DuPage bird checklists aplenty that you can grab and hand out to an interested party, or tack to a bulletin board at a local business, library, nature center, church, etc. I use my checklist to record my backyard bird list. Download a copy here.

- 4. Mention the DuPage Birding Club in the comments section of your eBird checklists. If you led or participated in a DBC field trip, share it with our eBird account, <u>DupageBC</u>. Mention the DBC in the comments section of your checklist—someone may spot it and become interested!
- 5. Share posts, news, and photos with DBC's social media presence on <u>Twitter</u> (@DBCBirds), <u>Facebook</u>, and <u>Instagram</u>. Share your expertise and interest by commenting on posts!
- 6. Refer people to our website and YouTube channel. If someone can't believe we have cuckoos living in DuPage County, tell them about this video. If someone is looking for local birding spots, have them check this out. We have tools for educators and new birders (see #2 above). If someone has a question, they can contact the club via website or by emailing dupagebirdingclub@gmail.com. We're happy to help people find answers to their ornithological questions.
- 7. Not shy about sharing your affiliations? Buy (and wear) some <u>colorful DBC apparel</u>.
- 8. Most satisfying of all, take a friend, family member, colleague, or acquaintance on a bird walk. If you see someone birding the trails, or if someone seems curious about what you're doing with that pair of binoculars strapped around you, tell them about the DBC!

Birds in the Garden: Creating and Enjoying a Bird Oasis Pam Karlson

NOTE: This program will not be recorded.

This past year many of us have spent more time than usual observing birds in our own backyards. July's program will provide inspiration for creating a great backyard bird habitat.

The program will feature Pam Karlson's photographs of the Chicago bird garden she created and its bird visitors, illustrating how it's possible to attract over 100 bird species in an urban garden. Tips include landscape enhancements, practices and plant selection, with an emphasis on natives and nativars. Chicagoland's importance along the migratory route, bird species diversity, habitat, diet/foraging, nesting, supplemental support and citizen science will also be discussed. Doug Tallamy's book, *Nature's Best Hope:* A New Approach to Conservation that Starts in Your Yard, includes Pam's city garden, exemplifying the power of urban lots.

Pam Karlson is a career artist and certified professional gardener/garden designer. Art, nature and gardening have been her passions since early







childhood. She has been rescuing migratory birds since 2004 as a volunteer with licensed wildlife rescue/rehabilitation organizations. Residing in Chicago, she co-owns Waxwing Studio, Inc. with her artist husband, specializing in design, illustration, gardening/garden design, and landscape watercolor painting.

58 Field Trips Year to Date—Time for a Shout-Out!

As we reach the half-year mark, it's time for a big shout-out to our field trip coordinators, Bonnie Graham and Joan Campbell, and the 27 field trip leaders who have made it possible to sponsor 58 field trips year-to-date, which includes 6 trips co-sponsored with Cantigny Park. In addition, there were extra trips some trip leaders scheduled to accommodate overflow registrants. This total is tracking WAY ahead of our typical year with 80 field trips.

Trips have explored DuPage and neighboring counties as well as distant sites like Hennepin & Hopper Lakes and the Mississippi River Valley. July 2021 Field Trips

Now is the time for birds to nest, raise their young, molt feathers, and prepare for the fall migration. There are opportunities for all types of birders to participate and enjoy the season.

Please remember that the weather can be variable and trails can be muddy, so dress accordingly and bring protection for biting insects, including ticks. We expect everyone to enjoy birding in a safe manner by being careful and prudent.

Participants are welcome to contact the leader if they have any questions. Our field trip leaders can help you find the trip's starting location if you need additional directions. Situations can sometimes change, so please check our DBC website www.dupagebirding.org for the latest status information.

NOTE: Registration with the trip leader is required; you are NOT registered until you receive a confirmation from the trip leader. Each trip has a participant limit ranging from 10 to 20 (including the leader). Absolutely no stretching the limit.

Field Trips will observe a few guidelines to ensure that our birding is safe and comfortable for all:

- It is expected that all field trip participants will follow the CDC's recommendations regarding masks and social distancing.
- Anyone not feeling well should not attend.
- Attendees of DBC field trips and other events who are under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a responsible adult.
- All field trip attendees should be aware of and follow the ABA Code of Birding Ethics.

Saturday, July 10, 9:00 am Swainson's Hawks, Kane County

Pre-registration with the leader is required, limit 15 participants.

This trip will be to look for the Swainson's Hawks that have traditionally nested in this area. Also, we will check out some nearby grassland locations for grassland birds such as Western Meadowlark. Pre-register for directions to meeting spot and/or car-pooling opportunities.

Designated as an Audubon Important Bird Area, this is the largest forest preserve in DuPage County. We will be looking for summer residents, including wrens, sparrows and marsh birds. Meet at the Pickerel Lake parking lot off Powis Rd.

Danada Forest Preserve (East), Wheaton

Pre-registration with the leader is required, limit 10 participants.

This morning we will look for grassland birds, and check out the lake and the wooded areas. Meet at the parking lot east of Naperville Rd. in Wheaton.

Pre-registration with the leader is required, limit 20 participants.

This morning trip is oriented towards our summer residents. Most of the walk will be on gravel or mulch paths. Wear appropriate shoes and bring bug spray. Don't forget to bring some water to stay hydrated. As always, new birders are welcome as we will take a leisurely pace to provide as much time as desired to look at each bird and to answer questions on equipment or bird identification. Meet at the Thunderbird Youth Camp Parking Lot. Go west on 79th St. about 1/2 mile; the entrance is south of 79th St., west of Greene Rd. in Naperville/ Woodridge.

Bird Sit at Fullersburg Woods, Oak Brook

Pre-registration with the leader is required, limit 10 participants.

This is a field trip for anyone who finds the long walks of our regular field trips too difficult or who would just like a less vigorous birding experience, but still share the camaraderie of fellow birders. Bring your folding lawn chairs, binoculars, and field guides. We will be birding at Fullersburg Woods near the Nature Education Center. We will meet in the main parking lot (NOT the lot for Graue Mill). Birders of all levels are welcome.

The main entrance is at 3609 Spring Road, 1 mile south of 31st Street and 0.25 mile north of Ogden Avenue. Fullersburg Woods website. Dress for the weather and bring bug spray (sitting, we are easy targets for mosquitoes!) and drinking water.

Thursday July 29, 7:00 AM

Bird the Park: McDowell Grove, Naperville

This is a leaderless birding experience, you do not need to sign up with the leader.

You will bird on your own between the hours of 7 AM and 10 AM. The idea is you will "bump" into fellow birders as you make your way along the trail loop, chat a little about what you are seeing, then move on and hopefully run into another birder further along the trail. You can start at 7 or sleep in and start at 8 or even 9!

The route we will bird is as follows: from the parking lot follow the West Branch trail south to the 1.2 mile loop trail head north on the 1.2 mile loop and follow it around and back to the parking lot. Map As always you can hike the loop in either direction.

McDowell Grove is on the east side of Raymond Drive, south of Interstate 88. The main entrance is south of Diehl Road, approximately 1 mile north of Ogden Avenue (Route 34). McDowell Grove website. Dress for the weather, bring bug spray and water.
