President's Message

Hello, Birders!

I saw the first flock of Sandhill Cranes fly over this week, a sure sign that winter is rapidly approaching. Along with the winter comes the end of my tenure as president of the DuPage Birding Club. It has been a busy, interesting, and fun year!

This year the board eased the club into hybrid meetings. There were a few rocky starts but VP Mike Warner's determination combined with Steve Constantelos' Zoom expertise made it happen. And for the first time in two years, club members met in person. Mike also brought together an interesting and varied group of speakers to our monthly meetings.

Karen Warner and Wally Levernier coordinated over 100 field trips this year to 36 different locations. Field trips are the heart and soul of the DBC. We offer more field trip opportunities by far than any other birding club in the area and that is only possible because we have an abundance of generous people who volunteer their time to lead them.

The board provided several opportunities for members to engage in other bird-related activities this year. Mike Warner and Steve Constantelos are responsible for making the idea of a DBC photo contest into a reality. In June, we had a Big Fun Morning thanks to the enthusiastic help of Vicky Sroczynski. In August we continued the tradition of a Birding and Breakfast and in early November the Volunteer Luncheon.

The DBC offered its first Beginning Bird Watching class this year. It takes a lot of time and work to put together a class. Denis Kania and Joe Suchecki did it all and then some, adding several new mini-tutorials to our YouTube education channel.

The DBC was also out sharing the joy of birding in the community this year. Under Donna Kubik's leadership and a dedicated group of volunteers, the DBC participated in the Aurora Pollinator Festival, the Gull Frolic, and monthly bird walks at the Prairie School of DuPage in Wheaton. Outreach also provided speakers for 12 venues throughout the area.

The board continued the DBC's support of bird-related projects with almost \$4,000 in grants and donations to organizations such as BCN, ABC, Willowbrook Wildlife Center and Midewin National Tallgrass Prairie. A special thank you to Joe Suchecki who worked with the DuPage Forest Preserve to coordinate DBC's \$2,000 donation for native shrubs planted at McKee Marsh. Joe also took on the sale of a beautiful decoy collection from the estate of Craig Holderness raising over \$3,000 for future club donations.

Jane Barnett, Angela Levernier, Dennis Streicher, Sirimon Reutrakul, and Steve Constanelos not only performed their duties as treasurer, recording secretary and directors but also volunteered to help out whenever an extra pair of hands were needed. Most importantly they shared their ideas, voiced their opinions, and gave thoughtful feedback on the many topics and issues that came to the board this year.

There is a dedicated group of committee leaders that work throughout the year to support the club. As president I had the opportunity to experience first hand how much they do to create an interesting *Drummings* newsletter every month, keep the website lively and up to date, share DBC news through emails and social media, coordinate the spring and winter bird counts and just keep things running smoothly. Thank you.

A very special thank you to Steve Constantelos and Joe Suchecki, our two outgoing board members. I am especially grateful for all your thoughtful suggestions and guidance. The DBC is very fortunate to have two such talented, dedicated members.

I look forward to another productive year for the DBC with the able leadership of Mike Warner and our newly elected board. A special welcome to new members, Robert Perez, Vice President, and Pamela Martyn-Nemeth, Director.

Thank you to all the members for granting me the privilege to serve as DBC president. I was pretty nervous about taking on the position but quickly learned that the DBC is full of friendly people willing to help and guide. I highly recommend to anyone who has the opportunity to serve as DBC president to grab it! It has been a deeply gratifying experience for me. Thank you.

Fermi Christmas Bird Count December 17, 2022

There's still time to sign up for the 47th annual Fermi Christmas Bird Count (CBC). The Fermi CBC circle has traditionally been sponsored by the DBC, and we usually have around 100 participants to count all the birds we see and hear on this one day in December. This is your chance to contribute to an important community science opportunity. Data collected provides invaluable insights into winter bird populations plus it's a great opportunity to connect with fellow birders.

If you participated last year, you're already on the list and will be contacted in early December regarding your counting areas. If it's been a few years, or you are new to the count and would like to participate, please contact the compiler, Jeff Chapman at jeffchapman948@gmail.com. Remember you'll be grouped with a team so no need to be an expert; there will be plenty of them on your team! This year's countdown dinner is TBD at this point. TIME IS SHORT, so don't delay! **Deadline to sign up for participation is December 9.**

McKee Marsh Planting Day Success—JOB WELL DONE!

WOW—what a morning we had planting more than 100 saplings and shrubs at McKee Marsh on November 6! The Club partnered with the Forest Preserve District of DuPage County on a project to improve habitat for our forest birds by restoring the understory of a local woodland. We provided a \$2,000 grant to the District to purchase native shrubs and saplings for planting in an area of McKee Marsh where nonnative, invasive shrubs and trees were removed. In the photo at right, fearless leader Joe Suchecki lays out the plan of action.

When the weather proved too cold and blustery on the original planned day of November 5, we flexed and rescheduled for Sunday, November 6. Fortunately, more than 30 Club volunteers could adjust their schedules and stay with the plan. We divided into a half a dozen work teams to dig, dig, dig! Angela Levernier first provided a little tutorial on the proper way to plant, and our friends John, Tonya, and Cathy from the DuPage Forest Preserve worked alongside us to mentor us. We thank them for giving up their Sunday to be there for us!

Hot coffee, juice, and delicious donuts and bagels kept our energy going, and we got the job done around 11:00 a.m. This included fencing sensitive new plantings to discourage deer browsing and generous watering of all new plantings. We believe restoring the understory vegetation will improve the habitat for woodland nesting birds such as thrushes and warblers, and the DBC and Bird Conservation Network will be monitoring species usage in the coming years. A big thank you to Joe Suchecki for championing this project and winning support from the Forest Preserve for proceeding. It will be an interesting case study for the impact of restoring native habitat.

Guidelines for Ethical Birding

We love our birds, but let's make sure we're not loving them to death—that is, let's make sure our behaviors do not diminish a bird's ability to survive and thrive.

ABA Birding Associate Code of Birding Ethics

American Birding Association's Code of Birding Ethics is the gold standard covering bird interactions. Whether you are a casual backyard birder or a serious lister, you should be familiar with these guidelines.

Audubon's Guide to Ethical Bird Photography

Being a responsible photographer means always putting birds and their habitats first. Review these guidelines to ensure that you are not disrupting natural behaviors or nesting and know the ethics for posting and sharing photos.

Respecting Owls: Ethical Owl Viewing and Photography

Owls are a special category as they are especially vulnerable to unintentional harm from overzealous birders. Make sure your observances don't stress them or cause them to abandon a nest.

December 2022 Field Trips

This is the month we learn which birds have decided to spend the winter in our area, including waterfowl, raptors, and songbirds. There are opportunities for all types of birders to enjoy the season.

Please remember that the weather can be variable, so dress accordingly. We expect everyone to enjoy birding in a safe manner by being careful and prudent.

Participants are welcome to contact the leader if they have any questions. Our field trip leaders can help you find the trip's starting location if you need additional directions. Situations can sometimes change, so please check our DBC website <u>https://dupagebirding.org</u> for the latest status information.

NOTE: For trips with a participant limit, registration with the trip leader is required. In those cases, you are NOT registered until you receive a confirmation from the trip leader.

Field Trips will observe a few guidelines to ensure that birding is safe and comfortable for all:

• It is expected that all field trip participants will follow the CDC's recommendations regarding masks and social distancing

- Anyone not feeling well should stay home.
- Attendees of DBC field trips and other events who are under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a responsible adult.
- All field trip attendees should be aware of and follow the ABA Code of Birding Ethics.

Sunday, December 4, 7:30 am

McKee Marsh, Warrenville

This site remains one of DuPage County's premier birding spots. Walk around the marsh with us to check out winter birds, as well as possible late migrants. Northern Shrike and American Black Duck are among the several species of birds known to regularly winter here.

Meet at the visitor parking lot on the north side of Mack Rd. (Mack is south of Roosevelt and north of Butterfield), located between Winfield Rd. and Rt. 59 in Warrenville. Be sure to dress for the weather. Leader: Kyle Wiktor, 708-506-5186

This field trip will include some good winter birding in wooded areas as well as some open water sections. Join us to look for a good variety while walking about 2 miles on uneven trails. Prepare for possible snow and/or ice depending on current weather. Meet in the main parking lot on Spring Road.

Pre-registration is not required for this walk. Come out for a Birding/Nature Walk at a local forest preserve. St. James Forest Preserve is a 595-acre preserve that contains more than 100 acres of woodlands, prairies, and wetlands. We will be looking for winter birds and enjoying the pristine winter landscape. Paths are gravel. Dress for the cold. The main entrance is on Winfield Rd. just north of Butterfield Road.
