# **President's Message**

Happy New Year, Fellow Birders!

I'm writing my first President's Message a couple of days before Christmas and it is 11° outside! Birding buddy Mark and I talked about going out this morning in search of birds, but we both agreed it was just too cold!

As I look out the window to my left, my backyard is abuzz with activity with birds all over the place! Chickadees are exploring every nook and cranny. A couple of White-breasted Nuthatches come for a sunflower seed or two from the tube feeder and dash off with them. I spot Tree Sparrows and Juncos beneath the thistle feeders scratching through the thin layer of snow in search of food. Above them, Goldfinch perch on the thistle feeder rods and munch away–most of them have turned a dull brown but a few still have a bib of bright yellow. A Blue Jay squawks as it swoops in for a whole peanut on the platform feeder and takes off with it (sometimes they swallow it whole). Five Cardinals look like bright red Christmas ornaments perched in the bare lilac bush in the back of the yard. At one time or another during the morning, most of the birds make their way to the heated birdbath for a drink or a quick dip (brrrr!).

I spotted movement on the trunk of our old pine tree and yelled, "Karen, there's a Brown Creeper out here!" My heart beats a little faster every time a Fox Sparrow joins the other birds beneath the thistle feeder. Watching birds still thrills me and it's an honor to be so closely associated with the hundreds of DuPage Birding Club members who have a similar affinity with birds. I encourage you to join me and your fellow DBC members on some of our many field trips this year because that's what DBC is all about—enjoying the birds around us with others who are just as passionate about birds as you are.

# 2022 Fermilab-Batavia Christmas Bird Count Results

On December 17, 2022, birders counted every bird they could see and hear within the 15-mile circle during the 47<sup>th</sup> Fermi-Batavia CBC. Despite blustery conditions, 74 species were observed in the count, below our 10-year average of nearly 84 species. Overall numbers were down, but we tied the high counts of Merlin (2) and managed two new species for the count: Ovenbird and *Selasphorus* hummingbird (likely Rufous). Thank you to all the area captains and counters in making this year another successful count!

**Where was the picture taken?** Savegre Hotel gardens in a valley in the Talamanca Mountains of Costa Rica

# **Down and Dirty Award**

Species of Bird: House Sparrow

Where was the picture taken? Fullersburg Woods Forest Preserve Narrative: I was at Fullersburg alone and enjoying the day. I didn't see anything too unusual or anything to write home about. I decided to take one last look from the large deck/overlook in hopes of seeing something interesting. Oh! I did see a sight I had never seen before. I was seeing some dirt flying around from the ground. I zoomed in with my camera and to my amazement I saw this House Sparrow having a field day in a dry patch of ground. It seemed he had made a clearing that he was able to nestle his body into. He then started flapping his wings causing the dirt to fall on him. He was just covered with dirt.

I was still wondering what this was all about so I went home and looked it up. I found out that this is called "dusting." It is a way for birds to, in a sense, take a bath to get extra oil off of their body and feathers so they can fly more efficiently and to keep parasites away.



## "Flight to Freedom" Award

Species of Bird: Red-tailed Hawk

Where was the picture taken? Greene Valley Forest Preserve, Landfill Mountain Narrative: Wow - this was some day! While at the Hawkwatch, our little group was rather puzzled to see a man drive up, and start unloading some animal crates from his vehicle. He was one of the rangers, helping out with Willowbrook Wildlife Center. He was there to release some rehabilitated birds: Cooper's Hawk (1); Red-tailed Hawks (3) and a young Great-Horned Owl. Our little group of volunteers were privileged to watch their release. Timing was essential due to the changing season, weather and migration. It was thrilling to see them individually released and take flight. I was able to get pictures of all, but this was my best action shot. The Red-tailed Hawk did a short jump flight to the end of the picnic table, to check his bearings, paused a minute or two before taking off to the chain link fence to study the terrain. A short while after that, he took to the sky, and was gone. I am glad for the staff, volunteers, DuPage Forest Preserve, and to all who contribute to release these birds and other wildlife back to their natural habitat. Fly well and live long!

# January 2023 Field Trips

This month we look for wintering birds in our area, including waterfowl, raptors, and songbirds. There are opportunities for all types of birders to enjoy the season.

Please remember that the weather can be variable, so dress accordingly. We expect everyone to enjoy birding in a safe manner by being careful and prudent.

Participants are welcome to contact the leader if they have any questions. Our field trip leaders can help you find the trip's starting location if you need additional directions. # NOTE: For trips with a participant limit, registration with the trip leader is required. In those cases, you are NOT registered until you receive a confirmation from the trip leader.

### Field Trips will observe a few guidelines to ensure that birding is safe and comfortable for all:

• It is expected that all field trip participants will follow the CDC's recommendations regarding masks and social distancing.

• Anyone not feeling well should stay home.

• Attendees of DBC field trips and other events under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a responsible adult.
