## **President's Message**

Greetings, fellow birders!

Being a birder has its benefits. Read on to see why birding is actually more than just a pastime—it's good for you!

#### 1. Birding Together - Birding For Life

Birding is a phenomenal activity for couples and I'm surprised there aren't more of them out on the trail. Karen and I enjoy planning each bird outing together. What's new and exciting to see out there? What equipment will we need (mucking boots, scope, water bottle, Diet Coke, almonds, PB&J, sunscreen, Hot Hands)?

#### 2. Birding Fits Your Lifestyle

Once you start birding, you will find that this is one activity you can adjust to your time, energy, and pocketbook:

You can go out searching for birds as often as you want and you determine where you want to go and when.

You decide how much you want to spend on equipment. Do you have an old pair of binoculars around? That's fine. Want to go out and spend \$2,000 on a fancy pair? Great, if you can afford it.

You can go birding when you're young and continue until you're old.

Birding is one of those activities that you can do as much or little as you want. Start just by observing and identifying the birds in your backyard. Then take a hike with your binoculars.

### 3. Birding Connects You with Nature

Some time during each birding expedition I'll stop, look around, and marvel at the sights, sounds, and scents of nature surrounding me. Be it a wooded forest, a sandy beach, a stream bubbling by, or a marsh filled with cattails, each place elicits in me a sense of awe and wonder.

### 4. Birding Helps You Get (Some) Exercise

Birding gets you outside and walking. A typical birding expedition for us is about 2-3 hours long. To be fair, birding is typically not an aerobic exercise but for a typical adult walking burns about 300 calories per hour so there are health benefits to birding.

#### 5. Birding Is Good for Your Brain

Birding is an excellent way to stimulate your brain because when you're out birding you're constantly working your brain as you see and hear birds and then interpret those sensory inputs. Birders work the temporal lobe to connect the image and/or sound of a bird to information about that species stored in the brain. Perhaps it was best put by Helen Macdonald in her award-winning book *Vesper Flights* (Grove Press, 2020), "For there's an immense intellectual pleasure involved in making identification, and each time you learn to recognize a new species of animal or plant, the natural world becomes a more complicated and remarkable place, pulling intricate variety out of a background blur of nameless grey and green" (p. 21).

#### 6. Birding Encourages You to Discover Your Neighborhood

One of the things we have enjoyed about birding is that it has taken us to some previously unknown natural areas very near to where we live. Karen and I have explored over 25 different parks and forest preserves right in DuPage County. Places that we've driven by hundreds of times before, without even glancing at, have now become regular stops in search of birds—like Lyman Woods. Thanks to birding we have a keener appreciation for the people who have worked to set aside, protect, and maintain these spaces for all of us to explore and enjoy.

### 7. You Can Learn So Much as a Member of The DuPage Birding Club!

All birders, regardless of experience, are welcome to join our club. As a member you get information about upcoming field trips and can sign up for them before nonmembers. Members also are encouraged to expand their knowledge of birds and birding by attending our club meetings (live or via Zoom) and get reports from experts in the field. DBC's <u>YouTube Channel</u> has lots of videos (many thanks to Denis Kania) that will inform you about bird identification. You can even use our website to find out where the <u>best places</u> in DuPage County for birding are.

As you can see there are many advantages of being a birder, especially for members of our DuPage Birding Club! Happy Birding!

## **April Meeting: Studies of the Red-tailed Hawk in Illinois**

What is the size difference between male and female Red-tailed Hawks? Are our Red-tailed Hawks migratory?

These and other interesting questions will be answered by Dr. Given Harper of Illinois Wesleyan University and his research assistant, Steven Burkett, who will share their findings from two research studies. The first is an Illinois Ornithological Society (IOS)-funded project in which they utilized equations to sex Red-tailed hawks via morphological measurements.

During the study, they live-trapped 82 red-tailed hawks and discovered their sex based on extracting DNA from their feathers.

We will also hear an update on another ongoing project in which they are determining if wintering Red-tailed Hawks in Illinois are year-round residents, or if they are migratory. This project was funded by DBC in an IOS grant of \$1,000. This is a great chance to learn more about the benefit of our donations and this common bird of our skies.

## Joe Suchecki Awarded Distinguished Achievement Award



At the March DBC meeting, long-time member Joe Suchecki was awarded the Distinguished Achievement Award in recognition of his exceptional service to the DuPage Birding Club. Denis Kania presented the award to Joe along with a "Kania original" of Klaas's Cuckoo, which happened to be the 3,000<sup>th</sup> bird on Joe's life list.

Joe has served on the Board in many capacities, including President and most recently Corresponding Secretary. In addition to these important roles, Joe has lent his creative and organizational talents in several other capacities.

Joe produced several tutorials on birding by ear for the DBC Education Channel and last spring co-developed with Denis Kania a Beginning Birder course for the Club. When the Club was looking for a new compiler for the Spring Bird Count, Joe answered the call. Joe has worked closely with the DuPage Forest Preserve District on various projects, most recently our McKee Marsh Planting Day, and is a great ambassador for the birding community. Joe also organized the



sale of our donated cache of decoys, which raised a significant sum of money we could donate to conservation projects.

And we all know Joe as the Springbrook Birder who puts in countless hours of work doing bird monitoring and ecological restoration. A well-deserved congratulations to Joe!

## Spring Bird Count is Saturday, May 6, 2023!

Hold the date and plan to participate in the 2023 Spring Bird Count in DuPage County on Saturday, May 6.

The Spring Bird Count is held annually throughout Illinois around the first weekend in May and is intended to provide some information and data on early spring bird migration throughout Illinois. The Spring Bird Count also is a great opportunity for birders of all skill levels to get out in the field and look for all those great and colorful spring migrants moving through northeastern Illinois. The DuPage Birding Club coordinates the spring count efforts in DuPage County, and last year we recorded 173 species on spring count day. Results from past counts can be found on the DBC website.

It is not too early to start getting ready for this year's spring count. If you have participated in the past, look for an email in mid-April from Joe Suchecki with information about the count, your area captain and your count area. ## Ready to Give Back? Become a BCN Breeding Bird Monitor

Want to help birds by giving back in a big way? Join a corps of birding enthusiasts who dedicate time monitoring our breeding birds each breeding season, adding to two decades of data that is useful to land managers and researchers. The Bird Conservation Network (BCN) is actively recruiting new monitors for its annual BCN Survey. DBC is a BCN member and a funding sponsor of their recently published 22-year analysis of breeding birds in Chicagoland.

This important community science project relies on birders with at least three years of experience to record evidence of species presence during the June and early July breeding season. BCN supports monitors with training that includes process guidelines, plus tools for enhancing skill-set for birding by ear. If you are not confident in your birding ID skills, we can pair you with an experienced monitor to get you started.

Have some favorite birding spots? Chances are good that one or more of them is a monitoring site opportunity. Become one of BCN's 200+ monitors – collecting vital information on species abundance and their population trends. Your time spent monitoring will make a world of difference for the birds!



**Best of Show - Bohemian Rhapsody** 

**Photographer: Emil Baumbach Species of Bird:** Bohemian Waxwing

Where was the picture taken? Orono, Maine

**Narrative -** This bird was one of about 100 that had a feeding frenzy in a clump of crabapple trees. I was looking to get a shot of a bird either flipping a berry in the air or holding one in its beak. Luckily this bird seemed to savor holding the berry. The exposed branch with three empty stems indicates the feast this bird was having. Is the bird tasting the berry with its tongue for ripeness before eating it? You be the judge.



### **Award For Most Artistic**

**Photographer:** Mike Davern **Species of Bird:** American Wigeon

Where was the picture taken? Riparian Preserve, Gilbert, Arizona

Narrative - I went to Arizona for work and brought along my long lens thinking I would look for some desert species. Little did I know I would end up at the Riparian Preserve in Gilbert where I was able to get 28 species on camera, many of them waterfowl, enjoying the wetlands. The Preserve is using a natural method to recycle 100% of the city of Gilbert's effluent water over 110 areas in 7 water recharge basins. It was an amazing area and 298 species of birds have been identified at the site. Definitely going to be a repeat visitor on my future trips to the Phoenix area.



**Best Foreign Portrait**

Where was the picture taken? Amboseli National Park in Kenya

Narrative - My wife Jane and I were fortunate to be able to go on an African Safari in December and were able to visit a number of National Parks or protected areas in both Kenya and Tanzania. This bird was one of the first flashy birds that I saw during a walk at the first lodge we stayed at on our trip. I was very excited and tried to get a photo of one; I got some photos but it was late in the day and the lighting was not very good. I took many photos of this bird during our trip that were OK, but it took me a while to finally get a decent photo. This photo was taken while we were out on a game drive and it was later in the day so the light was better. I finally got fairly close to this bird and he stayed on the branch long enough to let me take his picture. I would have liked to get one in flight as their wings are a vibrant and flashy blue color, but I had to settle for a still photo. That being said, I was very happy and appreciative that I was able to get a decent photo of this beautiful bird.

**Backyard Bird Award** 



for our yard! Then the next night, 16 showed up together. Delightful!




## **Best Action Shot Award**

Where was the picture taken? Collier County, Florida

**Narrative -** The three species of waders I see most often are Snowy Egrets, Tricolored Herons, and Little Blue Herons. Of the three, the Little Blues are the ones I've been able to photograph most often with a prey item. Here it's a sunfish: I've also taken a photograph of an adult with a crayfish and an immature with a Brown Anole.

## **Best Family Portrait**

Where was the picture taken? Freedom Park, Naples, Florida

**Narrative -** Because most of my birding has always taken place in the cracks and crevices of my daily life, I have not had the chance to explore this park in the past five years I've spent time in Naples. However, I recently took advantage of an opportunity to explore parts of this park I had not seen before. I was glad to see shrikes show up in an open area along a drainage canal--then I spotted a pair of wading birds. Experience suggested they were a small heron, but when I approached, I realized they were Limpkins, a relatively uncommon bird. I began photographing the pair; it was only after I took a few shots that I realized they were accompanied by five juveniles! While I watched, the birds caught and fed on apple snails.



Worth The (Frigid) Wait Award

**Species of Bird:** American Three-toed Woodpecker **Where was the picture taken?** Near Cook, Minnesota

**Narrative -** The looks we got of this American Three-toed Woodpecker was way beyond anything I was expecting. Completely made up for the fact that we had to stand on the side of a random county road for 2 hours in -28 degree weather waiting for him to make an appearance. We first heard him peeling bark, but deep in a spruce thicket on private property. After a while I spotted him flying across the road; the long wait was rewarded with looks of him foraging at eye level!



## **Best In Flight Award**

**Species:** Short-eared Owl

Location: Brunner Family Forest Preserve, Dundee, IL

**Narrative:** This is a lifer for me! These Short-eared Owls (about 4-5) were amazing: flying high, flying low, swooping down, wheeling around in flight, catching their prey, landing on the ground or on a stump, and a few in-flight discussions with each other. Birders and photographers respectfully observed from around the perimeter of a large fenced field which gave ample space and distance for the owls to hunt and be successful. I would love to say that I was this close to the owl, but I wasn't. Thanks to the APS-C sensor and the telephoto lens, I was able to grab this shot as the owl was mid-field.

## **April 2023 Field Trips**

These early spring field trips target migrating waterfowl, raptors, passerines, and shorebirds plus some returning breeders. We are offering a variety of field trips, including mid-week trips. There are opportunities for all types of birders to participate and enjoy the season.
