President's Message

Karen and I just completed a nine-day Field Guides birding trip to Alberta, Canada (in fact I'm writing this as we fly home from Calgary). During our trip we saw over 165 species of birds in Alberta, and what struck me is that two-thirds of those you can find right here in and around DuPage County! Some newer birders may not realize how blessed we are to have such a wide variety of birds to observe in this region (325 species have been recorded in DuPage alone). True, we don't get many Grizzly and Black Bears, Badgers, and Pronghorns in DuPage County, like we saw in Alberta, but as far as birding goes, you couldn't ask to be in a better birding region than right here.

A great way to see many of the birds in and around DuPage is to sign up for a DuPage Birding Club field trip. Each month's field trip list is emailed to members near the end of the month and they're also <u>listed</u> on our website and right here in *Drummings*.

I've had the good fortune to be a participant on several of the recent field trips and I've enjoyed each one of them. The DuPage Birding Club is known for the number and variety of field trips it offers each year: we couldn't do them without volunteer leaders who step up regularly to guide a group around one of the various birding spots we are so fortunate to have here.

As I attended these field trips, I noted some ways participants can make them even more enjoyable for everybody. Here are some suggestions to keep in mind when attending one of DBC's field trips:

<u>Promptness Counts!</u> Try to get there on time (or let the leader know if you can't). Sometimes a group of 10+ people will stand around a parking lot waiting for that one person who hasn't yet arrived.

<u>Birding Can Be a Social Activity, However...</u> Field trips are a great opportunity to catch up with your birding buddies, but sometimes the birding takes a backseat to the socializing, which can distract others in the group. If you want to socialize, hang back near the rear of the group or catch up after the trip has ended.

<u>Be a Birding Buddy</u> The DBC has had many new birders join the past few years and they sign up for our trips to improve their skills. While on a field trip be on the lookout for those that are struggling to see that elusive bird or are unsure which bird they are looking at/listening to. Some groups can be too large for the leader to help every participant get on a bird, but you can help.

Let the Leader Listen The best birders identify and then find many birds by ear. Be aware of when the leader stops to listen, then become quiet to give him/her an opportunity to locate that next great bird for the group.

By following these suggestions, you just might find a Lifer on your next field trip.

July 13 Meeting in Person and Via Zoom: Offshore and Nearshore Waterfowl and Waterbird Monitoring in Western Lake Michigan

Presenter: Bill Mueller, Director Emeritus of the Western Great Lakes Bird and Bat Observatory

Have you ever wondered what kinds of birds visit Lake Michigan in the winter? Bill Mueller, Director Emeritus of the Western Great Lakes Bird and Bat Observatory, conducted offshore and nearshore waterfowl surveys between 2010 and 2015 to find out. His group flew parallel transects between the shoreline and 15 kilometers from shore, in rectangular survey blocks from Door County, Wisconsin, to the IL/ WI state line utilizing a twin-engine, fixed wing aircraft.

Through their surveys, they detected thousands of waterfowl of 10-16 species, including several species of loons and grebes, and 6-7 species of gulls. Bill will talk to us about how the project was implemented and the findings it generated.


Best of Show - Caspian Tern

Beginning Birder Class Earns Kudos

The course consisted of three Zoom sessions interspersed with three field experiences covering the basics about birds and identification, habitat and seasonal differences, how to use binoculars, birding by ear, resources, and more.

Birding-by-Ear Tools Available through BCN

The Bird Conservation Network, of which DBC is a member, has released tools that will enhance birding-byear skills for our summer and resident birds. These tools were developed to help BCN's breeding bird monitors improve their identification skills but are generally useful for anyone that wants to learn our resident bird songs.

The links below are four guides to vocalizations organized by habitat type in which the bird species are likely to be found. The four habitat-specific study aids contain links to appropriate Xeno-canto audio recordings for species songs and/or calls for each of the species listed in the BCN Trends Analysis as breeding within the Chicago six-county area where BCN's 22-year database was compiled. Also linked/attached are the PowerPoint slides from new-monitor trainings led by Vicky Sroczynski in May. Finally, here's a link to mnemonics for a wider list of bird species that you may find useful from the Roanoke Valley Bird Club.

News from the DuPage Forest Preserve

Progress continues on West Branch DuPage River Trail. Agreements were made with the wastewater authority of West Chicago and Winfield providing for easements on portions of the West Chicago/Winfield Wastewater Authority Property for the West Branch DuPage River Trail.

The West Branch DuPage River Trail is a 26-mile regional trail, roughly paralleling the DuPage River-West Branch that, when complete, will connect the North Central DuPage Regional Trail on the north to Naperville and into Will County on the south, where it will intersect with the East Branch DuPage River Trail and continue south as the DuPage River Trail to Channahon.

The Forest Preserve District has been working with DuPage County, local municipalities and park districts to implement this trail for decades. With the completion of the trail segments through downtown Winfield and along Fair Oaks Road from 2016-2018, the only unfinished trail segment is the segment located between Blackwell and West DuPage Woods. This segment is approximately 0.7 miles in length and includes a bridge crossing the West Branch DuPage River and Roosevelt Road (IL-38). As this trail has been in the works forever, it is good to see planning and permitting in progress.

July 2023 Field Trips
