President's Message

Hello, birders! If you're not familiar with the Cornell Lab of Ornithology's monthly magazine, *Living Bird*, I would highly recommend it. The magazine is not only full of interesting articles, but it also has a wide array of travel suggestions. One of the things that jumped out to me in the latest edition was a letter from Ian Owens, the Executive Director of the Cornell Lab. His letter, titled "What's in a Name?" discusses the controversial AOS decision to rename 152 species that have eponymous names, or are named after a person.

I may be opening up a can of worms here, but to be honest, I've had a lot of mixed feelings about this decision. I've followed the news on this topic quite closely since the decision was made official last year. As someone who studies and appreciates history, I can't help but feel we're going to lose something when some species' names change. I'm a bit worried that people like Georg Wilhelm Steller (of which there are three bird species named after him), will be forgotten. The story about his expedition to Alaska and Siberia is incredibly interesting and harrowing.

For a lot of us, adopting the new names of birds that we've grown up with will be hard. A lot of you have been birding far longer than I have, so I can only begin to imagine how hard it will be to start calling species such as Cooper's Hawk, Wilson's Warbler, Bell's Vireo, and other species by a different name. Owens addresses this directly in his article saying "At the same time, I'm keenly aware that people feel a strong attachment to certain species names. I suspect I'll pine a little for Blackburnian Warbler—yes, it's eponymous!—although I can easily see the charm of a new name like Fire-throated Warbler."

Personally, I think Fire-throated Warbler sounds a lot cooler than Blackburnian Warbler. This letter actually did a lot to sway me to the side of supporting these name changes. Imagine some of the other cool names that can be created! Next time you're out birding and see a species that has an eponymous name, try thinking of the most unique name you can come up with.

Change can be hard, but as birders we adapt. No one calls the Long-tailed Duck by its old name—a change that was made in only 2000. Instead of dwelling on the past, I think we should embrace the future and the new bird names that will come along with it!

SAVE THE DATE: Spring Bird Count May 4

Spring is almost here and it's time to plan your participation in the 2024 Spring Bird Count in DuPage County on Saturday, May 4.

The Spring Bird Count is held annually throughout Illinois around the first weekend in May and is intended to provide some information and data on early spring bird migration throughout Illinois. The Spring Bird Count also is a great opportunity for birders of all skill levels to get out in the field and look for all those great and colorful spring migrants moving through northeastern Illinois. The DuPage Birding Club coordinates the spring count efforts in DuPage County, and last year we recorded 171 species on spring count day. It is not too early to start getting ready for this year's spring count. If you have participated in the past, look for an email in mid-April from Joe Suchecki with information about the count, your area captain, and your count area. Last year we had 148 participants counting birds on the spring count in DuPage. We would like <u>even more</u> people to participate this year. Outreach Team Connects with the Community

On February 20, Natalie McFaul and Andie Duffy presented a children's program at the Lemont Library called *Birds Can Fly, Why Can't I?* The focus was "5 Reasons Why Birds Can Fly." After an interactive lesson with Andie accompanied by great slides from Natalie, the 10 participants, first- through third-graders and one four-year-old, made a paper bird that could flap its wings. Afterwards there were other activities: observing feathers with magnifiers, matching their "wingspan" to various birds' spans, playing bird sounds on an Identiflier device, and finding familiar birds among picture cards.

Natalie and Andie report that the group size made everything very manageable and the children were very well-behaved and participated enthusiastically. Kudos for your creativity, Natalie and Andie.

Also at the Lemont Library the same week, Bob Fisher presented *What a Tweet - Winter Birding Chat* to adults interested in learning more about the birds found in our area during the winter months.

Announcing the Monty and Rose Wildlife Habitat



On Valentine's Day 2024, the board of the Chicago Park District approved a new name for the 3.1-acre expansion of the natural areas at Montrose Point, commonly known to date as "the old volleyball area," adjacent to the Cliff Swallow nesting colony. In 2021, thanks to efforts led by Leslie Borns, this area was removed from recreational use and added to the natural

areas. Moving forward, it will be officially known as **The Monty and Rose Wildlife Habitat** and signs will go up this year with the new name. This is a fitting tribute to Piping Plovers Monty and Rose who made Montrose their breeding ground for three consecutive seasons, stole the hearts of Chicagoans, and created strong conservation awareness among their followers. News from the DuPage Forest Preserve

Forest Preserves Considered a Good Value by Residents

Responses on a county-wide survey for the Forest Preserve District were collected from nearly 1,000 household residents in DuPage. Among these, 82% were favorable of the Forest Preserve District of DuPage County with only 4% containing negative viewpoints. The remaining percent were neutral. The ratings for DuPage FP District came out much higher than the average state rating and were comparable to the nearby Lake County scores on a similar survey. Given that only 2% of a household's property taxes contribute to the district, general opinion was that the preserves are a very good value.

Habitat Improvements Planned for Early 2024

Waterfall Glen Forest Preserve: The Sawmill Creek Pedestrian Bridge Replacement will be completed in spring with the laying of asphalt. (Winter is an unfavorable time of year for such projects.)

Pratt's Wayne Woods Forest Preserve: A trail connection project of .2 miles of concrete trail will link the Lake Trail to West Trail Connector Trail in Pratt's Wayne Woods Forest Preserve. This project was funded by a statewide grant. The project should begin in spring of 2024 and will be completed in the summer.

Willowbrook Forest Preserve: A contract was awarded for clearing 10 acres of invasive trees and shrubs in the back area of Willowbrook Forest Preserve. Any native trees and shrubs that should not be removed will be flagged prior to the project. The project will begin in early 2024 and be completed by the end of spring.

March 2024 Field Trips

Spring is just around the corner. Come and join us for an early spring field trip. This month's trips target migrating waterfowl, raptors, passerines, and shorebirds plus some returning breeders.

Please note that Fermilab is a government research facility and has strict access requirements: All participants aged 18 and over must have a REAL-ID compliant state ID or passport to enter the site. When on site, you must remain in public areas at all times, have a visitor's tag visible, and leave the same way they came in. When arriving at Fermilab, present your ID and let the security guard know you are here for bird watching, they will provide a visitors tag for you to wear. We will cover a variety of habitats, but will primarily look for waterfowl, sparrows, and early migrants. We will cover about 2 miles - mostly on wide, but occasionally uneven mown grass trails – as we walk a loop around the AE Sea Nature Area.
