

Drummings September 2024 President's Letter

Hello, fellow birders! The summer is quickly winding down and fall is fast approaching. I visited Montrose Point Bird Sanctuary this past weekend to see what I could find. There had already been reports of fall warblers, so I drove down there early in the morning to test my luck.

Sure enough, I got a Cape May Warbler! However, the highlight of the trip was a sleeping Whip-poor-will, which I was able to photograph. Although I've

seen Whip-poor-wills before, this was the first time I was able to photograph it. This served as the inspiration for this month's President's Letter.

As birders, how do we continue to stay interested in the birds? Don't get me wrong, I enjoy seeing all kinds of birds, but Cardinals, Robins, and Starlings can get a little boring after a while. Unless you're a relative beginner, you're not likely to



add much to your life list outside spring and fall migration.

The summer and winter months can be slow times for a lot of birders. However, by simply adding new goals to your birding, you may find these months as rewarding as migration!

Some birders compete with themselves by creating state, county, city, and yard lists. For them, further lists keep birding competitive, and a relatively common bird can be exciting to see if you can add it to a new list. Even if you've seen a Cape May Warbler before, you may not have seen one in DuPage, Cook, or Kane. You may not have seen one in your yard. I have a long-running goal of submitting a bird list for every county in Illinois (currently 36/102), as well as continuing to add birds to my grandma's yard list (currently at 119). By setting these goals, it gets me out, exploring new parts of the state and looking more closely at my surroundings.

Photography is another thing that can keep birding interesting. I've mentioned my multiple life lists in a previous letter, but in one of those lists,

I keep track of the birds I've photographed. My goal is to photograph all the birds I've seen. It's been fun to go back through that list and study what I have and have not taken a photo of. I was shocked to find out I've never taken a photo of a Chimney Swift! By setting this goal, it helps me work on my photography skills as well as track down species that have eluded my lens.

What are some things you've added to your birding that keeps it interesting? Do you have multiple lists for different places or months? Do you keep track of what birds you've photographed?

As we enter fall migration, I want to remind people that DBC has numerous resources on our website and YouTube page (see "Let's Be Ready" on page 4) to help you with any tricky fall migrants. I hope to see you out on the trails and best of luck with birding this fall!


Let's Be Ready: Fall Migration Gets Underway

September 2024 Field Trips

Late summer and early fall are the time for resident birds to raise their young, to molt, and for many species, to begin their migration south. September is also the best time to see migrants coming through, especially fall warblers. This month we have a variety of morning and afternoon trips and hawk watch opportunities at the end of the month. Join us on one of the many trips offered—21 field trips to be exact, including 4 hawk watch mornings!

There are opportunities for all types of birders to participate and enjoy. As always, nonmembers are welcome. There are no fees for birding trips.

Please remember that the weather can be variable, so dress accordingly. We expect everyone to enjoy birding in a safe manner by being careful and prudent. Field trip information is also found at: www.dupagebirding.org

Participants are welcome to contact the leader if they have any questions. Our field trip leaders can help you find the trip's starting location if you need additional directions.

NOTE: For trips with a participant limit, registration with the trip leader is required. In those cases, you are NOT registered until you receive a confirmation from the trip leader.

Trips will observe a few guidelines to ensure that birding is safe and comfortable for all:

- Anyone not feeling well should stay home.
- Attendees of DBC field trips and other events under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a responsible adult.
- All field trip attendees should be aware of and follow the ABA Code of Ethics: <u>https://dupagebirding.org/aba-code-of-ethics/</u>

Tuesday, September 3, 7:30 am – 10:00 am, McDowell Grove Forest Preserve, Naperville Pre-registration with the leader is required, limit 12 participants.

This morning trip will focus on woodland migrants passing through our area. This is a popular migrant hotspot in both spring and fall. If birds are on the move, we will be in a great location to view them. Meet in the first parking lot after entering the preserve. The entrance is at the intersection of Raymond Dr. and McDowell Rd. where there is a stoplight.

Thursday, September 5, 7:30 am - 10:30 am, or so, McKee Marsh, Warrenville <u>Pre-registration not required.</u>

This site remains one of DuPage County's premier birding spots. Walk around the marsh with us, approximately 3.25 miles, to check out resident species. Targets include resident birds, raptors, waterfowl, fall warblers and other migrant species. Most of our walk will be on preserve limestone and earthen trails; wear appropriate shoes and clothing. Meet at the visitor parking lot on the north side of Mack Rd., located between Winfield Rd. and Rt. 59 in Warrenville.

Thursday, September 5, 5:30 pm - sunset, Greene Valley Forest Preserve, 83rd Street Fluddle, Naperville

Pre-registration with the leader is required by email, limit 10 participants.

Meet at the north end of the <u>Greene Road parking lot</u>. We'll make our way east to the 83rd Street Fluddle area, with the primary goal being to look for migrating shorebirds, with birding along the way as time permits. Scopes/tripods are highly recommended, and trip leader will have one. Fall shorebird IDs can be difficult even with experience. Trip leader will be happy to help people who may be new to it, but it will help to review field guides, eBird/Merlin, and/or some of the DBC YouTube content (<u>Yellowlegs</u> <u>and Similar Waders</u>, <u>Peeps</u>) ahead of time. The trail to the Fluddle is not maintained, so take appropriate measures for ticks and mosquitos.

Greene Valley has a lot of great habitats in it, but you can't really cover more than one in a typical field trip due to distance. We will bike around the preserve to hit all of the good spots in one run. Bring your bike and we will cover the whole of Greene Valley over the course of a few hours. Expect to ride about 10 miles with a few light hills (no overlook). We will be sticking to the limestone/paved trails. Meet at the north end of the <u>Greene Road parking lot</u>.

Fall Hawk Migration Extravaganza at Greene Valley Forest Preserve Overlook/Fisher Point No limit on number of participants.

Let's gather at the top of the overlook, right after the gate is unlocked at 11:00am. We'll have a short site orientation, explain hawk watch techniques, and do a quick review of Hawk Migration Association of North America's Hawk ID sheet. We picked these two weekends to give us the best chance to witness

together the spectacle of Broad-winged Hawk migration. At the end of September, Broadwings leaving the US start passing by hawk watches in large numbers, depending on wind and timing.

We'll have raptor field guides on hand as well. If you don't already have the free *HawkWatch International Raptor ID* mobile phone app, this is worthwhile for the descriptions, photos, and, especially, the videos that show flight styles of different hawks.

Bring a chair, hat, water, and a sack lunch or snacks. There is no shade here, so a solar umbrella may be useful to you. It can also be much cooler than at ground level, especially with northerly winds; so please bring layers.

Please note that Fermilab is a government research facility and has strict access requirements: All participants aged 18 and over must have a REAL-ID compliant state ID or passport to enter the site. When on site, must remain in public areas at all times, have a visitor's tag visible, and leave the same way they came in. When arriving at Fermilab, present your ID and let the security guard know you are here for bird watching. Full details on public access to Fermilab can be found <u>HERE</u> and the trip leader will send out additional details to registered participants closer to the date of the trip.

We will cover a variety of habitats while looking for any fall migrants and with a primary focus on sparrows. We will walk a loop around the AE Sea Nature Area which will cover about 2 miles on wide, mown grass trails. We may venture into unmaintained grassy areas, so please be prepared for ticks. Depending on time and interest, we may drive elsewhere within Fermilab. We will meet at the 'Red Barn Area' located at the end of Sauk Circle <u>Google Map Link</u>. If needed, Fermilab security can provide a site map and directions to this area when you arrive.

Nygren is a beautiful wildlife refuge located in Rockton, Illinois, owned by the Natural Land Institute, a 501(c)(3) non-profit land trust which was created in 1958 by George Fell, one of the founders and first executive director of The Nature Conservancy. It covers over 700 acres of pristine wetlands, woodlands, and prairies, making it a diverse and important ecosystem in the area. It is a waystation for Sandhill Cranes as they migrate south for the winter. On this field trip, between the evening and daytime walks, we hope to see a variety of waterfowl and raptors, including Northern Harrier and Rough-legged Hawks and early migrants like Lapland Longspurs and late sparrows. We will also look for Northern Shrike, and Barred and Short-eared Owls.

We will be visiting Ferguson Forest Preserve and perhaps Sugar River Forest Preserve during this trip.

This trip will be led by **Dan Williams**, who has lived in Winnebago County for over 50 years and has been birding for more than 45 years. He is currently a member of the Illinois Ornithological Records Committee. He has been the President and past board member of the Natural Land Institute, the owner of the Nygren Wetland Preserve, and a former member and past chair of the Land Advisory Council, a citizens advisory committee of the Winnebago County Forest Preserve District. The purpose of the LAC was to advise the Forest Preserve Commission regarding land acquisition opportunities.

Additional birding opportunities:

Cantigny Park in Wheaton posts Accessible Birding walks and related events several months in advance on the calendar pages of <u>Events | Cantigny</u>. For that reason, the events are often at capacity by the time DBC publishes its monthly calendar. To ensure your spot on a Cantigny walk, check the park's website and follow the sign-up instructions.
