President's Letter

Hello, fellow birders! I'm going to try something a little different in this letter. Like it or not, election season is upon us, and as many of you know, I started out my professional career in government. In fact, I have degrees in both political science and history, with those subjects being as near and dear to my heart as birds are—although the birds usually give me the most joy.

If you're planning on voting in DuPage County this November, you'll come across a referendum for the DuPage Forest Preserve District. DBC is a non-political organization, so I cannot endorse the referendum one way or another. With that said, I am hoping to provide some information on the reasons behind the referendum to you. As someone who studied political science, I know all too well that voters tend to overlook most referendums as they can be hard to understand.

As birders, the Forest Preserves in DuPage County are near and dear to our hearts. I would imagine that almost all members visit them during the year, especially in the spring and fall. Covid-19 brought increased visitation to the forest preserves and with that came additional strain on the preserves. Declining populations across DuPage County and Illinois as a whole have led to a decrease in the volume of property taxes citizens pay to the District. These are the main factors driving the District to ask for additional resources to continue their work of conservation, education programming, and restoration projects.

Since the last voter-approved referendum, the Forest Preserve District has added hundreds of additional acres of property and dozens of miles of trail, and it has embarked on numerous projects to restore our forests, rivers, and streams. All of this work costs a lot of money. If the property tax levy remains the same, the District will be forced to make cutbacks, which will inevitably diminish their ability to continue their work.

Unlike the local municipalities we reside in, the Forest Preserve District doesn't have access to additional sources of revenue such as sales tax, income tax, or utility taxes. The District is thus reliant on property taxes to sustain their budgets. Unlike many government entities, some of which I've worked with, the District has maintained proper financial transparency, so citizens can keep track of where and how their money is being spent. The proposed referendum is asking citizens of DuPage County to pay an estimated \$11.67 more per year for every \$100,000 of your property value.

November 14 Meeting, In-Person and Via Zoom: A Close Look at Gull Identification

Amar Ayyash, Gull Identification Expert and Author of The Gull Guide

DBC is pleased to welcome Amar Ayyash as our November speaker. Amar is both an expert on the gulls of North America and an evangelist for "gull recreation." He coordinates the Illinois Ornithological Society's Annual Gull Frolic on Lake Michigan, hosts the popular website anythinglarus.com, and administers the North American Gulls Facebook group.

Amar is often found speaking at birding events and leading field trips throughout the continent. Much of his free time is dedicated to traveling the world to photograph and study gulls. Amar has published a number of papers and articles on gull identification, distribution, and molt. He is the author of the upcoming book, *The Gull Guide* (October 2024).



Amar's presentation will focus on highlighting key identification field marks for separating our most common gull species. He will touch on often-ignored topics in gull-study such as the aging process, plumage, and molt. Gull identification is often considered the bane of birders' existence. This is the meeting to come to if you want to learn more about the diverse world of gulls.

November 2024 Field Trips

This is the month where migration wraps up and early winter birds are seen.

There are opportunities for all types of birders to participate and enjoy. As always, non-members are welcome. There are no fees for birding trips.

Please remember that the weather can be variable, so dress accordingly. We expect everyone to enjoy birding in a safe manner by being careful and prudent. Field trip information is also found at: www.dupagebirding.org.

Participants are welcome to contact the leader if they have any questions. Our field trip leaders can help you find the trip's starting location if you need additional directions.

NOTE: For trips with a participant limit, registration with the trip leader is required. In those cases, you are NOT registered until you receive a confirmation from the trip leader.

Trips will observe a few guidelines to ensure that birding is safe and comfortable for all:

- Anyone not feeling well should stay home.
- Attendees of DBC field trips and other events under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a responsible adult.



News from the Forest Preserve

The proposed pedestrian bridge over Rt. 83 in Cricket Creek Forest Preserve is now in Phase 2 design with construction beginning the winter of 2025 and completion anticipated for 2026. This bridge will improve nonmotorized access across Rt. 83. It will be a 10-foot-wide path with 3-foot grass connecting residents to Berens Park and the Salt Creek Greenway. Funding sources included the City of Elmhurst with grant funding from state and federal sources.
