

President's Letter

Hello DBCers,

I just returned from Arizona where I was visiting friends and family and of course doing some birding. While there I had the opportunity to attend a meeting of the local chapter of the National Audubon Society.

The speaker that night was Krissy Kondrat from Arizona Fish and Wildlife and she spoke about the Motus wildlife tracking system, something that was new to me. Motus is an international network of researchers who use radio telemetry to track birds in their travels. It can also be used to track bats and dragonflies. A very tiny transmitter is fastened to the subject and emits radio signals when it flies within an 11-mile range of a reception tower.

These towers are erected along migration routes either as a freestanding tower in an open area or attached to a building. The device gathers information from the passerby, which can then be downloaded to see which individual has been located, allowing the researcher to gain data on the subject. More information is gained this way than through conventional banding which relies on a bird being recaptured. It was news to me that there are seven radio towers in the Great Lakes area of Michigan, Illinois, and Ohio as well as some downstate. One tower is located as close as the Chicago Botanic Garden. Towers in the Great Lakes Area have detected Kirtland's Warblers, Eastern Whip-poor-wills, Black Terns, Common Nighthawks, and others.

I thought this was a very interesting new method of learning about birds' migration patterns and another step forward in conservation efforts to try to make life easier for our feathered friends. (They may also be looking for more volunteers.)

To change the subject, we're looking forward to our Members' Night meeting on March 13 and the chance to see what some of our people have been up to. Our meeting will be held at the College of DuPage in the Health Science Center, Room 1234. Enter through the main door on the first floor and proceed just past the stairs on the right. I hope to see you there. Members' Night is always better in person!

Avian Flu Impacting the Chicago Region's Birds

Avian influenza (H5N1 bird flu) is posing a serious threat to birdlife in the Chicago region this winter. Since mid-December, Chicago Bird Collision Monitors and local wildlife centers have received hundreds of calls regarding birds displaying symptoms of avian flu from across an eight-county area.

Initially, most cases of H5N1 bird flu were found in waterfowl—with reports that ranged from one to 50 sick or dead geese—but as dead birds were not removed from the environment, species preying on the remains had a greater chance of being exposed to the virus. Hawks, owls, and eagles are now also being recovered with the signs most often associated with H5N1 bird flu. These symptoms include weakness, lack of balance, tremors, diarrhea, closed or clouded eyes, and respiratory problems.

Given the poor prognosis for a bird to survive avian influenza and the serious risk of this highly contagious virus spreading to other birds in a rehabilitation setting, birds demonstrating flu symptoms can only be humanely euthanized. Many centers are not even admitting these birds for euthanasia out of an abundance of caution to prevent exposure to other bird patients and humans. We do not know when this current outbreak will end, but the virus does not survive well in warmer temperatures, which we will reach this spring.

Officials are telling the public not to handle birds displaying signs of avian influenza and to avoid contact between their pets and wild birds. You can learn more from the <u>U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service</u> and this <u>Illinois Department of Public Health news release</u>. People should also contact their <u>IDNR District</u> Wildlife Biologist if they see more than five dead birds.

March 2025 Field Trips

Spring is just around the corner. This month's trips target wintertime resident birds as well as early spring migrants, and waterfowl. We also have our Mississippi River trip this month. It's a good time to get outside and go birding!

Participants are welcome to contact the leader if they have any questions. Our field trip leaders can help you find the trip's starting location if you need additional directions.

NOTE: For trips with a participant limit, registration with the trip leader is required. In those cases, you are NOT registered until you receive a confirmation from the trip leader.

Trips will observe a few guidelines to ensure that birding is safe and comfortable for all:

Anyone not feeling well should stay home.

- Attendees of DBC field trips and other events under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a responsible adult.

Tuesday, March 4, 9:00 am – 11:00 am, The DuPage Greenway Trail, Bolingbrook Pre-registration required by text or email.

We'll explore riverside habitat looking for resident birds and migrating waterfowl. New birders welcome. The DuPage Greenway Trail is a paved trail in Bolingbrook that runs alongside the East Branch of the DuPage River. The trailhead is on Royce Rd just west of Rt. 53. It is about a mile and a half walk to Whalon Lake.

News from the Forest Preserve: A Little History Lesson

Scott Kobal recently presented a history of plant studies in DuPage, an interesting look back at how our knowledge of plant communities has evolved over the decades.



The story began with Dave Johnson who was director at the District from 1962-1993. At the beginning of Johnson's tenure, there were about 1,300 acres of property. His goal was to bring a preserve to within 10 minutes of their homes for all residents. He raised the number of acres in the Forest Preserve System to 30,000. Dr. Robert Betz of Northeastern IL University was a pioneer for saving remnant prairies such

as Belmont in Hinsdale, Stevens Cemetery, and the re-creation of the prairie at Fermi Lab. He is one of the first to suggest documenting species present in a given area.

The movement continued with Floyd Swink and Ray Schulenberg from the Morton Arboretum, who were instrumental in looking at inventories of plants in a geographic area. Wayne Lampa was the one who started the collection of data with inventory and monitoring at Fullersburg Woods in 1971.

In 1973 a classification system was originated using the DNR and Dept of Conservation for mapping what was present in the District. Air photos and windshield assessments were some of the original methods implemented for searching plant communities. Gradually they gave way for a three-letter code for the various plant communities. All this data collection was done by hand and documented on paper maps.

In the 1990s, inventories in earnest were undertaken with the help of a computer program designed by staff at the arboretum. Topography was added and there are 1100 ecosystems identified in the 60 preserves. GIS data is available after decades of work on preserve communities.

Dr. Gerald Wilhelm worked to establish monitoring programs and categorizing species. Wilhelm came up with the Natural Areas Rating systems which he initiated in Kane County. There are four classes of land considering management and use. Inventory is one step in determining land classification. Consistent monitoring for changes impacting the plant communities is another. For example, in one-acre woodland plots are studied considering the forest floor, light, tree mortality, and new tree growth. All are recorded to track changes and the area's resilience.

In open areas, "Herbaceous Monitoring Transects" are square frames set in straight lines through an area. The District studies ecosystems in 20 preserves using this method. In addition, staff are working with other agencies such as the Chicago Botanic Garden, the US Fish and Wildlife Agencies, and the IDNR on Federally-identified endangered or threatened local plants and their location in Forest Preserves. Now rare plants are also being reintroduced in appropriate preserves. The District is truly the Caretaker of our County's natural heritage.
